

Our photo this issue is part of the shaft of the so-called 'Tall Cross' at Monasterboice, Co. Louth. It was probably made sometime in the tenth century. On it, you can see clearly two of the sculpted panels. They depict scenes from the Old Testament. Can you figure out what each represents?

The upper panel depicts Abraham about to sacrifice Isaac at God's command before the Angel tells him to stop and sacrifice a goat instead.

The lower panel depicts Moses striking the Rock at a place near Kadesh in the Sinai bringing forth water for the thirsty Israelites. God, however, had instructed Moses to *speak* to the rock, and in striking it, Moses offended God. God punished him by not allowing him enter the promised land.

Would you have known all this just by looking at the sculpted panels of the high cross? We all need help and guidance in making our way through the world – especially when we suffer from a major debilitating disease like multiple sclerosis.

Sativex

MS Ireland received recently the great news that Sativex has been recommended for reimbursement, subject to a managed access programme. Details of the managed access programme are yet to be shared.

Sativex (nabiximols) is a cannabis-based medicine. The drug can be prescribed for the treatment of MS-related spasticity when a person has shown an inadequate response to other symptomatic treatments, or found their side effects intolerable. Sativex can be used in addition to a person's current anti-spasticity medication.

According to Consultant Neurologist Dr Hugh Kearney, "Sativex will be an additional pharmacological treatment available for spasticity in MS. Our hope is that with better disease modifying drugs for MS we will see complications like spasticity much less often. This medication option may not suit everyone as it has many possible side effects, so other treatments such as physiotherapy and occupational therapy will still be as important as ever."

STUDY ON STIGMA IN MS

Call for participants

A study led by Dr Rebecca Maguire from Maynooth University aims to understand if people with MS experience any stigma from others in relation to their condition. Dr Maguire is an Associate Professor in the Department of Psychology at Maynooth University and also a person living with multiple sclerosis (MS).

This research will also explore why some people with MS choose to hide their diagnosis or symptoms from others and whether this has any impact on their psychological wellbeing.

The anonymous survey will take about 15 minutes to complete and is open to all people with MS who are over the age of 18.
